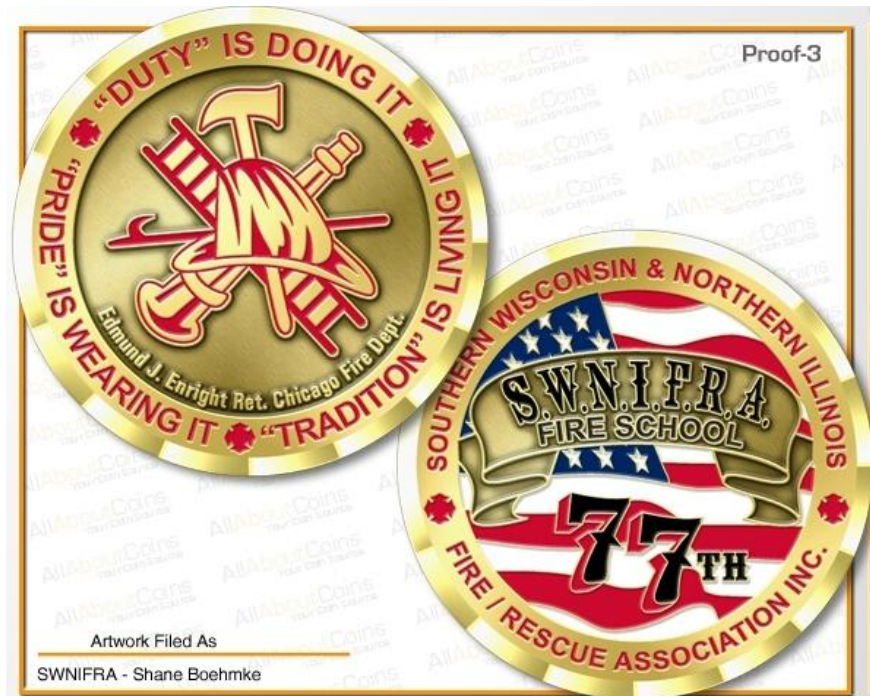

I have been asked to express some thoughts on "DUTY, PRIDE & TRADITION" for the F.O.O.L.S. web site. In doing so, it shall be my intent to instill a strong sense of awareness, stressing the importance and value of firefighters to themselves, their families, fire departments, and their communities. THAT WILL BE MY "DUTY".

"DUTY" is defined as at one's post or work, a task or chore one is expected to perform. It is answering the bell and being asked to perform tasks that challenge our physical and mental toughness under extreme conditions. It is our duty to prepare for these tasks through training, leadership, and "Esprit De Corps". It is our moral obligation to be doers in the fire service, to prepare for, come at and meet the enemy... "BATTLE READY". The fire ground is a battleground. "PRIDE" is defined as a state of feeling of being proud, a reflection of credit upon oneself. Pride is feeling good after a job well done! It is a feeling of goose bumps as you recount your actions; by going somewhere nobody else can go. By making a rescue and saving a life by being a part of a unit that successfully achieves its goal. Pride is wiping a tear from your eye and swallowing a lump in your throat, as you are hugged and kissed by a loved one, thankful you have returned safe and sound. Pride is a glow in your kids as they brag about you being a firefighter. Pride is wearing your uniform, proud of your colors, proud of your co-workers and fire department. Being a member of "THE NOBLEST BREED".

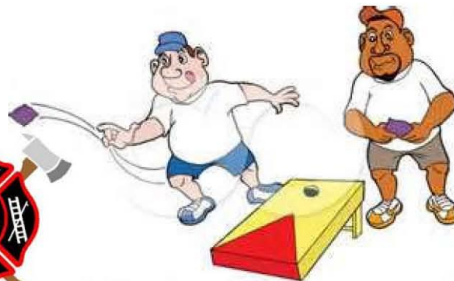

Friday 8 hour Class Room Classes

F-9 In the Realm of Risk: Surviving the Fireground (new)

Lead Instructor: Mike Mason, Ret Lt Downers Grove FD

Course Description: This all encompassing seminar provides firefighters through all ranks a look into the overwhelming risks and inherent dangers of firefighting in today's fire service. Lt. Mike Mason takes you into the realities of risk and its consequences in modern day firefighting. This complete program will enlighten you while providing you a detailed reality in surviving the fireground for your department and its members. Some of the most interesting areas to be covered will be, defining and committing to interior operations, fireground situational awareness, fireground survival policies, preventing and surviving Maydays, Staffing and fireground survival, fighting fires in conventional and light weight construction, fuel loads and turbulent smoke behaviors, interior operations relating to room orientation, tactical air management and practices on interior firefighting, recognizing the attack progress, establishing exit strategies and emergency evacuations, preparing for survival and Maydays while commanding stressful fireground events are just some of the many areas covered in this dynamic program. The program is filled with video and visual PowerPoint's that make this presentation a complete training event for all from firefighter to chief.

F-15 Leadership Principles for the Fire Officer (new)

Lead Instructor: Chief Craig Haigh, Hanover Park FD, Field Staff Instructor, IFSI

Course Description: Due to time constraints of job, family, and the needs of the department, many leaders of small organizations are unable to commit the time required to attend formalized classes on leadership. This course is designed to address the leadership principles necessary to effectively direct and manage volunteer, combination and small career departments. This course will identify leadership philosophies and facilitate a patch of discovery designed to help the student identify their own leadership qualities, strengths and weaknesses. Discussion of individual department challenges is encouraged.

Chief Haigh will provide numerous examples, case studies and insights drawn from his 29 years of experience leading volunteer, combination and career fire departments.

Target Audience:

Fire Officers from volunteer, combination and small career departments.

In the 8-hour format students will spend a significant amount of time working in groups to complete tasks and learning from each other. The class also includes a movie used as a case study on leadership. The class can be broken into a 4-hour format but will be significantly limited in discussion and will revert to a more lecture based training.

Friday 8 hour Hands On Classes

F-1 Basic & Intermediate SCBA Training

Lead Instructor: Jeff Van Patten & Jim Cook/Antioch IL FD

Course Description: This class is designed as a confidence builder for those individuals who have limited experience using Self Contained Breathing Apparatus. The majority of this class takes a hands-on format with students working

in a maze with blacked-out masks. The mission of this course is to return the student to their department with a full understanding of their SCBA, its components, uses, limitations, and emergency procedures, and the ability to survive in a hostile environment using their mind, body, and SCBA. Cadets/Explores are welcome in this class, **Safety Rules Apply & SCBA**

F-2 Conventional Forcible Entry (new)

Lead Instructor: Battalion Chief Erich Roden, Milwaukee FD, Lt. Ray McCormack, FDNY, DC Brian McNulty, AC Aaron Lipski and Capt Dan Lipski

Course Description: This course will cover the intricacies of conventional forcible entry with the two tools that should get any firefighter through virtually any door: the flathead axe and the 30" halligan - more commonly known as the "irons." Students will learn the proven methods of forcing inward and outward doors, and how to overcome the locking mechanisms most commonly encountered by firefighters. Come spend a day learning the skill sets needed to ensure that the engine company and searching firefighters can get inside the fire building, every time.

F-3 Basic Foam Operations (new)

Lead Instructor: John Moore Huntley FD

Course Description: Foam, this class is designed for the student to get a better understanding on the different types of foam, the properties of foam & how foam works in the morning. After lunch the instructors will then put it all together as you get to flow foam in the afternoon.

F-5 Basic Fire & Arson Investigation, with hands-on (new format)

Course Description: With departments downsizing &/or pooling their resources, the task of fire & arson investigation is one resource not to overlooked & could be standardized easily. Whether you have been in the fire service for 6 months or 20 years, consistent & recognized procedures are crucial to a thorough & complete investigation. Some legal aspects, hands-on evidence collection, effects of suppression, etc. will be covered. The student will leave with the ability to help establish standard policies & procedures for fire investigations. This course can also benefit those who desire to transition into the field of fire & arson investigations. F-6 First in Truck

F-11 Vehicle Extraction-Crash Bash

Course Description: This program is heavy hands-on car cutting. Students will learn techniques & procedures from a group of instructors who specialize in extrication/disentanglement. Students will rotate through a series of evolutions

which will include stabilization (cars on their sides, on wheels, on roof) door popping, fifth door, Noah's Ark (or clamshell), dash push, dash lifts, & tunneling. **Safety Rules Apply**

F-12 Single Family Operations (new)

F-21 Dying inside: The Game Has Changed, Has Your Playbook? (new)

Lead Instructor: Al Rufer: Division Chief Monroe FD, Nick Bartels LT Monroe FD

Course Description: Despite recent reductions in firefighter fatalities, firefighters continue to die inside of structures at an alarming rate. The mental and physical scars left behind after a flashover last a lifetime. Today's fires consume more synthetic and petroleum based materials than natural products. The structures are bigger, tighter, and built with materials that are rated by strength and without consideration to fire resistance. Chief Officers to probationary firefighters should take part in this interactive class. Learn the **NEW** fire model and the critical elements interior firefighters need to look for, feel for, and listen for, to stay alive in today's fires. Witness first-hand the signs of an impending flashover and experience the heat they generate. Participants will leave with a new appreciation for what's going on inside the "Box" and the tools necessary to reduce the risk they face.

Basic firefighting tactics that include direct and indirect attack; we will also demonstrate a myth and reality during this class that will cover the difference between smooth bore and a combination style nozzle. Students will be inside to see a fire from the beginning to watch it go through the stages to rollover/flameover. You will knock the fire down and let it grow back. During this time, students will get to see the different effects of a smooth bore nozzle vs. a combination nozzle as Instructors point out thermal layering. **Safety Rules Apply –Live Fire**

Safety Rules

The following Safety Rules regarding personal protective equipment (PPE) will apply for classes at this year's Monroe Fire School. These classes are identified in the Class Information section. **NO EXCEPTIONS WILL BE MADE.** If "Safety Rules Apply" is indicated in the class description, students must bring the following equipment in order to participate:

1. **Helmet** (NFPA approved) **and proper eye protection**
2. **NOMEX™ protective hood**
3. **NOMEX™ PBI coat with liner & NOMEX™ PBI pants with liner** (NFPA approved)
4. **Firefighting boots** (NOTE: 3/4-length boots are not approved in lieu of pants)
5. **Gloves** (Cal OSHA or NFPA approved)
6. **Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus. Note:** One SCBA for each two students from the same department will be accepted provided they are in the same class. Air cascade systems will be available to refill tanks. Each tank must have an acceptable hydrostatic test date stamped on it. **Dates are to be within five years for steel tanks and three years for aluminum composite tanks.** All SCBAs must be positive pressure type and be NFPA approved.

Any training involving **Live Fire will comply with NFPA Standard #1403 LIVE FIRE TRAINING EVOLUTIONS.** **Wherever an SCBA is required, no facial hair will be allowed. This includes any facial hair other than mustaches.** Protective hoods over beards are not safety approved. Each class will have a Coordinator/Safety Officer assigned to it and present at all times. The Coordinator/Safety Officer will inspect all protective clothing and equipment and will have the final say as to whether or not a student will be allowed to participate. **The Coordinator/Safety Officer's can recommend dismissal of any student who, in their belief, is acting in an unsafe manner. They will have to express their concerns with the School Coordinator &/or President of SWNIFRA. The School Coordinator & President will have final say.**
